Adoption of Conditions Of Readiness For The RE-  
OPENING OF SCHOOL**

- Adopted the conditions of readiness for school re-opening (Attachment A of Resolution)
- Directed the Superintendent to monitor and report back to the Board at future Board meetings regarding the implementation of readiness of school re-opening
- Directed the Superintendent to recommend to the Board when it is safe to re-open the District's schools, including a recommended plan and timeline, whether by hybrid, gradual re-opening



# Return Together Vision Statement

Sac City Unified will disrupt the current status quo of systemic inequity to meet the academic, social and emotional needs of all our students, especially our most vulnerable students. Such disruption must result in higher learning standards and accountability. **Our Return Together Plan will abide by all county public health orders to safely serve as many students as possible through in-person instruction.** Because we recognize the evolving nature of this pandemic, all of our learning models will meet the needs of all students and mitigate learning loss, assuring that all students are given an equal opportunity to graduate with the greatest number of postsecondary choices from the widest array of options.

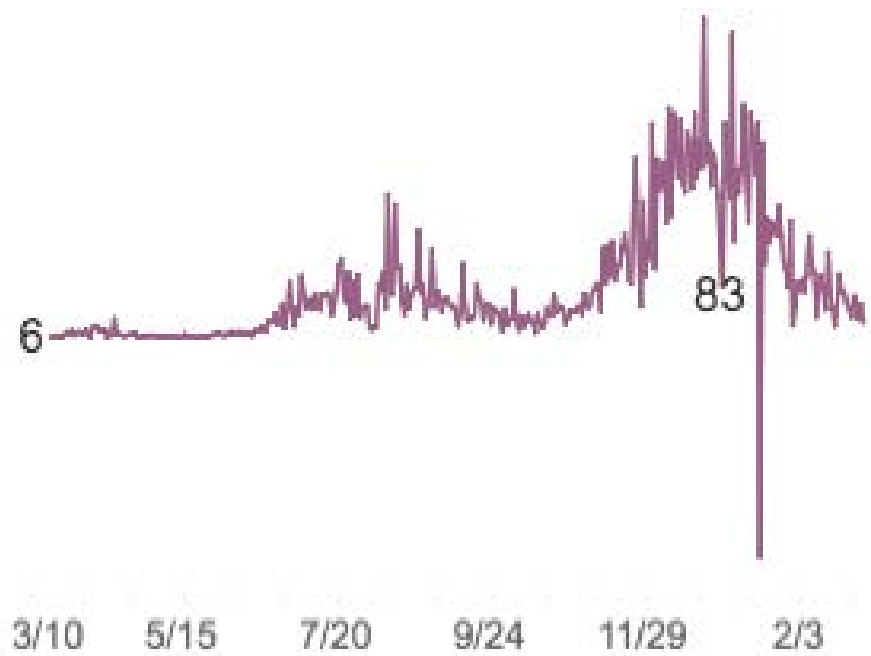

PK-6th schools are allowed to open when 7-day avg. case rate is *less than 25 cases a day per 100k residents*

# Re-Opening Tier Parameters

*The County Must meet the criteria for case rate and positivity rate for the next tier for the prior two consecutive weeks before advancing to the next tier.*

## Purple

- Schools are allowed to open when 7-day avg. case rate is less than 25 cases a day per 100k residents
- Offer optional in-person instruction to all students with exceptional needs if consistent with each student's individualized educational program and all prioritized students
- Offer optional in-person instruction to all students PK-2<sup>nd</sup> grade
- Schools not already open to all students for in-person instruction must remain closed
- Schools conducting in-person instruction or supports must maintain mitigation measures, including social distancing, face coverings, and sanitization, in compliance with schools guidance from CDPH and Sacramento County Public Health.

## Red

- Sacramento County will move to red tier when the avg. case rate is less than 4-7 cases a day per 100k residents (currently 12) and the positivity rate is 5-8% (currently 4.7%)
- Schools can reopen for all grade levels on the Wednesday after reaching the red tier.
- Schools conducting in-person instruction or supports must maintain mitigation measures, including social distancing, face coverings, and sanitization, in compliance with schools guidance from CDPH and Sacramento County Public Health.



# Amended Assembly Bill 86/Senate Bill 86 Governor and Legislature Revised Plan 3/1/21

## In-Person Instruction Grants:

- \$2 billion to support in-person instruction, based on LCFF funding
- Must offer continuous in-person instruction by April 1 (April 5 after factoring in Spring Break)
  - After April 1 - loss of 1% of funding for each instructional day that passes without in-person instruction
  - In-person instruction must start by May 15 or all funding is forfeited
- Must post COVID-19 Safety Plan at least 5 days prior to offering in-person instruction

## In-Person Instruction Grant requirements:

- Cohorts of prioritized students in all grades
- Purple tier (< 25 cases per 100K) - All students in grades TK-2
- Red/orange/yellow tiers - All elementary grades, and one middle or high school grade

## Labor Relations:

- No reference to a requirement for a collective bargaining agreement (CBA) as a condition of receiving the funds or as a condition for reopening. However, districts should note that even in the absence of any explicit requirement for a CBA in order to be eligible for the grant, existing requirements to collaborate and negotiate with labor partners under the Educational Employment Relations Act (EERA) remain.

## Amended Assembly Bill 86/Senate Bill 86 Governor and Legislature Revised Plan 3/1/21

### Testing & Safety:

- 10% of vaccine allocation reserved for education workers
- While in the purple tier, as a condition of grant funding, districts are required to follow asymptomatic testing cadence referenced by CDPH
  - >14/100,000 - weekly testing of students and staff
  - < 14/100,000 - testing every two weeks for students and staff
- Two outbreaks of COVID-19 within a school prompts an immediate CDPH safety review

### Expanded Learning Opportunity Grants:

- \$4.6 billion in funding allocated according to LCFF funding, with an additional \$1,000 in per-pupil funding for each student experiencing homelessness
  - Funds can be used immediately through Aug. 31, 2022
- At least 85% of funds must be used for in-person activities
  - 10% must be used to employ paraprofessionals to support instruction
- By June 1, governing board must adopt a plan describing how funds will be used
  - Shall provide an opportunity for parents and staff to be involved in plan development

- February 16th Sacramento County moved further into the Phase 1b group to include education & childcare staff

    - Vaccination is voluntary and by appointment only
    - As of 3/2 all eligible staff have received an invitation for vaccination from SCUSD and/or SCPH

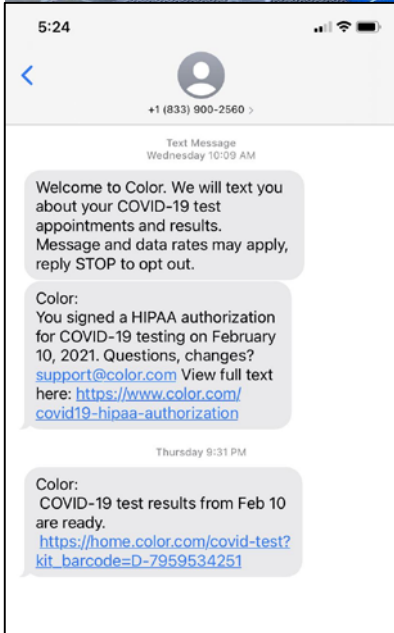
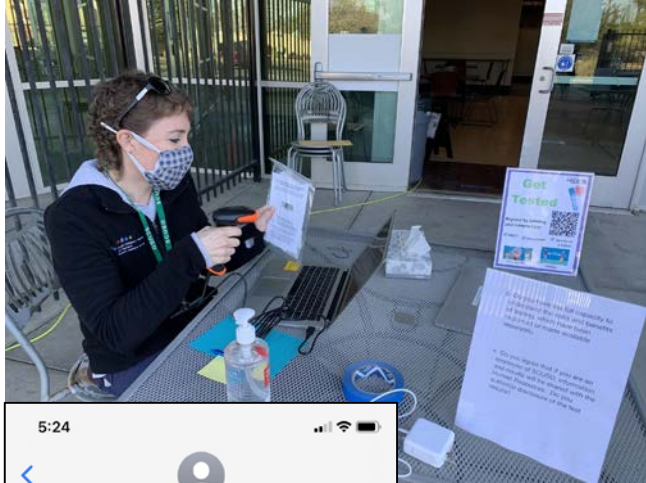
## Testing



- Routine SCUSD on-site testing **IN PROGRESS**
  - Health Services will provide COVID testing for staff and students at all Learning Hub sites and all district locations based on county tier assignment - testing is conducted during the school day
  - Week of March 1st - setting up sites and getting staff & students registered into the Color platform
  - Week of March 8th - begin on site testing at work and school sites
    - PCR Testing – Results are available in 24-48 hours
    - Rapid Antigen Testing – Results in 15 minutes.

# In Progress Dashboard Metrics

## Site Safety



- Plexiglass barriers: **IN PROGRESS**
  - Front counters - completed in November 2020
  - Library counters - will be completed by March 6, 2021
  - Multipurpose and meal counters - complete in February 2021
- Directional signage and stanchions: **IN PROGRESS**
  - Stanchions provided to each site - complete January 2021
  - Directional arrows and signage provided - will be completed by March 31, 2021.



# Third Party Facilities Assessment

- PBK Architects specialize in COVID-19 readiness assessments.
- Multiple California school districts have contracted with PBK for COVID-19 readiness assessment--including Twin Rivers, Natomas, Galt, and Robla in our area.
- Initially walked each site last December 2020 to outline any adjustments needed to best mitigate COVID-19.
- Adjustments needed are being made now.
- PBK has scheduled and will complete final inspections of our facilities by March 26, 2021.



# Information about AB 841

AB 841 provides State funding to upgrade HVAC and water fixtures in public schools through competitive grant program

- *Prioritizes schools in underserved communities and those near freeways or industrial facilities*
- *Will provide funding for the assessment, repair & replacement of HVAC systems, provide new HVAC filters, and provide for the installation of CO2 monitors*
- *Provides funds to replace aging and inefficient water fixtures and appliances in schools*

# Ventilation and Filtration Guidelines

SCUSD Facilities Department continues to track reopening of schools guidelines issued by:

- *The California Department of Public Health (CDPH)*
- *The Centers for Disease Control (CDC)*
- *American Society of Heating Refrigerating and Air-Conditioning Engineers (ASHRAE)*

A multi-layered approach was created by Staff to prepare for eventual reopening of schools

- *CDC and CDPH both refer to ASHRAE for ventilation standards*
- *Specifics to address ventilation continues to evolve as CDC issues new direction, and the overall approach remains sound*

The Centers for Disease Control (CDC) continues to provide new information and guidelines on returning to school, the latest issued on **March 1, 2021**



# CDC Guidelines (highlights)

Bring in as much outdoor air as possible

- *Where safe to do so, open windows and doors*
- *[Hold] activities, classes or lunches outdoors when circumstances allow*

Ensure HVAC systems are maximizing ventilation

- *Service HVAC and ensure they are meeting codes*
- *Bring in as much outside air as possible*
- *Consider running air 2-hours before and after building is occupied*

Filter and/or clean the air in school

- *Improve level of air filtration as much as possible*
- *Consider portable air cleaners*

Use exhaust fans in restrooms and kitchens

- *Inspect and maintain exhaust ventilation*

Open windows in transportation vehicles

# Ventilation and Filtration - Peer Schools

## San Juan USD

- *MERV-13 already in place*
- *No portable HEPAs*
- *No CO2 devices*
- *2 hour flush of air before and after classroom occupancy*

## Folsom-Cordova USD

- *MERV-13 already in place*
- *No portable HEPAs*
- *No CO2 devices*
- *50% outside air, running 24/7*



# Ventilation and Filtration - Peer Schools

## Natomas USD

- *All MERV-13 (unknown if in place yet)*
- *No portable HEPAs*
- *No CO2 devices*

## Elk Grove USD

- *Mix of MERV-13 and MERV-8*
- *Will consider HEPAs when less than MERV-13 and feasible*
- *No CO2 monitors*



# SCUSD Ventilation/Filtration Goals

## VENTILATION GOALS

- Upgrade filters wherever possible, from MERV-8 to MERV-13
- Tune up HVAC units in all schools
- Provide portable HEPA filtration units for classrooms that do not have MERV-13 filters
- Portable HEPA filtration units may be deployed to large spaces as MERV-8 filters are upgraded to MERV-13
- Flush air in classrooms minimum of 2 hours before and after class
- Consider upgrading to CO2 monitors with bond or grant funds in future
- Consider upgrading HVAC units if necessary, with bond or grant funds



# SCUSD Progress to Date

## Replacement of HVAC filters 3x per year

- First cycle replacement completed December 2020
- Second cycle replacement will be completed March 12, 2021
- Third Cycle replacement scheduled to begin May 1, 2021 (cycle can start as early as April 1, 2021)

## Filter Assessment

- Facilities staff to determine if MERV-8 filters can be upgraded to MERV-13 using 2" and 4" MERV-13 filters in existing HVAC units
- Assessment will be completed March 5, 2021
- Facilities staff identified a vendor with 2" & 4" MERV-13 filters in stock

## MERV-13 filtration goal

- District has ~2,500 classrooms
- Facilities staff believe that between 1,500 and 2,000 classrooms can be outfitted with MERV-13 filters without replacing HVAC units



# Selection of Portable UVDI Filtration Units

District sought guidance and a “common standard” ventilation from the State

- *Common standard was not issued in a timely fashion*
- *CARES funding deadline was December 30, 2020*
- *District contacted 11 commercial entities, with 3 responses*

District criteria for selection included

- *Mitigation of COVID virus in conjunction with other ASHRAE standards*
- *Large open classrooms (average size 960 square feet)*
- *Inadequate electrical infrastructure in many parts of the District*
- *Health and Safety of staff tasked with replacing HEPA filters*
- *Addressing VOCs caused by wildfire smoke*
- *Improving general indoor air quality*





# Selection of Portable HEPA Filtration Units

Staff also conducted another review of HEPA filtration units without UVDI technology

District criteria included

- *Mitigation of COVID virus in conjunction with other ASHRAE filtration and ventilation standards*
- *Large open classrooms (average size 960 square feet)*
- *Inadequate electrical infrastructure in many parts of the District*

6 HEPA units met basic criteria and 4 units could handle classrooms size

- *Purchasing located 3,000 units that can be shipped and delivered by April 1, 2021*
- *Adequate supply to cover classrooms*



# Additional Testing and Assessment

Qualified 3rd party identified to test the UVDI unit - due diligence

- *Forensic Analytics will provide proposal by March 5, 2021*
- *Testing of UVDI unit in 5 spaces across 3 campuses to determine if unit can clean the classroom air to meet District criteria*
- *Testing of UVDI unit in a closed space to ensure unit does not produce unsuitable by-products*

Qualified 3rd party identified to prepare Districtwide mechanical assessment

- *Arch-Nexus/Capital Engineering will provide proposal by March 5, 2021*
- *Assessment to determine whether to replace, repair, or upgrade each HVAC unit to meet MERV-13 filtration standards*

AB-841 and CO2 sensors

- *DSA determined that CO2 sensors articulated in AB-841 only apply to new buildings*
- *Facilities staff will use the Arch-Nexus/Capital Engineering Districtwide mechanical assessment as a basis for creating a HVAC project list (which may include CO2 sensors)*



## Other Ventilation Items

District staff evaluating further ventilation enhancements at school entry points and public spaces

- *Ceiling fans with UV up-lighting or ionization*
- *Seeking input from peer schools*

Consider UVC HVAC solution by utilizing UVC “in-duct air disinfectant”

- *Can be coupled with MERV-8 filtration, but costs not available yet*

Portable HEPA units may not be large enough to accommodate gymnasiums

- *Consider outside activity in lieu of gym use*
- *Consider alternative solutions, including outdoor activities where practicable*



# Summary of Ventilation

District will run HVAC with open dampers and 100% outside air while best practices are established

- *Seeking best practices about air changes/hr. & running units at night to save energy*

District will install MERV-13 filters wherever possible

- *Prioritize elementary school classrooms, followed by MS and HS*

Classrooms with MERV-8 filters will have portable HEPA units

- *Purchasing Dept. confirmed that 3,000 portable HEPA units can be delivered by April 8, 2021*

Opportunities and Challenges

- *MERV-13 filters may shorten lifespan of HVAC unit or create more repair work*
- *Procurement and installation of MERV-13 filters is possible in the next filter cycle, beginning on May 1 (or April 1, if desired)*
- *Tune up of HVAC systems by end of summer; Staff seeking capable HVAC vendor*

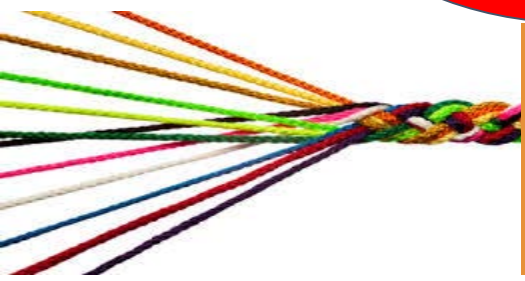

## Providing a Pandemic Safety Net

As trained experts in relationship-building and service-delivery, SSHS staff were characteristically responsive to the needs of our students and families as they shifted significantly with the COVID-19 pandemic.

This conscious acknowledgement of the rapidly changing needs of our clients allowed us to **increase the number of students served by 31%** over the same period of time last academic year, despite a decrease in ready access to families due both to distance learning and a significant decrease in referrals from site staff. By using a **proactive outreach strategy**, we **increased our pandemic-era outreach by 61%** as compared to the last quarter of last academic year, and **increased home visitation by 194%** over Q1 of last academic year.

## Concurrent Learning Model

- Distance Learning will remain an option for families (group C).
- Those students who choose to return in person will be split into an A and B group.
- The A and B group attend school in person for two days a week and engage in distance learning for 3 days a week.
- Students keep their same teachers.
- Synchronous teaching of students in person and at home concurrently.
- Time in the day for targeted small group instruction.
- Technology hardware set-up is needed in each classroom.

# Learning Hubs

- Learning Hubs offer a pathway to reentry for our schools. They provide opportunities to re-engage with students, additional adult support, much needed social emotional assistance, stable Wifi and connectivity, and a safe space for students to be while families are at work
- We are excited to continue Learning Hubs at 14 sites when we shift to in-person learning
  - It will look different given students will be with their teacher during in-person time, and then return to their hub space
- Current Hub students will have priority and will attend Monday-Friday
- Learning Hub schedules will remain unchanged (i.e. 8:00 AM – 2:30 PM or 9:00 AM – 3:30 PM)
- Program schedule:
  - Check in / Screening / Breakfast
  - Log-in to teacher's google classrooms, or attend in-person learning
  - Lunch
  - Academic Support and Enrichment

# Expanded Learning

- Youth Development will offer Expanded Learning programming at 43 additional sites for a maximum of 3.5 hours each day
- Expanded Learning Program will start Immediately once in-person learning concludes
- Expanded Learning includes academic supports, tutoring, snack, physical activities, and enrichment activities provided by supplemental providers
- Priority will be given to students as addressed in AB/SB 86 with a focus on students:
  - Experiencing homelessness
  - Residing in foster care
  - English Language Learners
  - Students receiving special education services; and
  - Disengaged students

## Concurrent vs. Non-Concurrent Model

## Learning Model and Phase In

  - Assuming Sacramento County moves to Red Tier all 7-12th grade students return no later than May 6th

# Nutrition Services



Meals will continue to be provided each day at no cost whether students participate in on-campus learning or distance learning.

## **Meal Distribution for Students Participating in Hybrid Learning**

- Students engaged in on campus learning will take “grab and go” lunch and breakfast for the next day home when reporting in person each day
  - Eliminates the need for monitoring meals in the classroom
  - Quick entry and exit from campus
- 3 days of meals will be provided through curbside distribution on Mondays

## **Meal Distribution for 100% Distance Learning Students**

- 5 days of meals will be provided through curbside distribution to students on Mondays at any of our open meal service sites

## **Water**

Disposable drinking cups will be provided for elementary classrooms which have sinks for water. Secondary students will be encouraged to bring refillable bottled water from home. Bottled water will be made available as needed.
